Abdulla Avloni, one of the leading representatives of Jadid thought, paid particular attention to the relationship between morality and social development. According to him, a society lacking moral values cannot achieve lasting stability regardless of its economic or political achievements. Avloni maintained that honesty, responsibility, patriotism, diligence, and respect for others were essential qualities for building a harmonious social order.

The Jadids also understood that social stability requires active civic participation. Unlike traditional political structures that often concentrated authority within limited circles, Jadid

thinkers advocated greater public involvement in social and political affairs. They promoted the development of civic consciousness and encouraged individuals to recognize their responsibilities toward society. This emphasis on civic engagement reflected their belief that sustainable development depends on the active participation of educated and socially responsible citizens.

The issue of national identity occupied a central place in Jadid socio-political thought. During a period characterized by colonial domination and cultural pressures, Jadid intellectuals sought to strengthen national consciousness while simultaneously embracing modernization. Abdurauf Fitrat argued that nations capable of preserving their cultural identity while adopting scientific and technological advancements would be better positioned to achieve long-term development. For Fitrat, modernization did not imply abandoning national traditions; rather, it required their adaptation to contemporary realities. This approach remains particularly relevant in the context of globalization. Modern societies face the challenge of balancing participation in global processes with the preservation of cultural uniqueness. The Jadids demonstrated that national identity and modernization are not mutually exclusive but can complement one another. Their ideas suggest that cultural continuity provides an important foundation for social cohesion and resilience in times of rapid change.

The socio-political vision of the Jadids also included significant concerns regarding social justice. They criticized inequality, corruption, and administrative inefficiency as major obstacles to societal development.
